

Supply List for Quilt Canada 2026 Workshop

- Workshop Title: From Sketch to Stitch with Inktense Pencils
- Date & Time: Thursday, June 18, 8:30 am – 4 pm, 90-minute break for lunch
- Location: See signage for room when you arrive
- Kit Fee: Required - \$10 (cash in envelope with your name, correct change is appreciated.)
- Required Kit Includes:
- Pattern, aloe vera, small container, use of stencils
- CQA/ACC Supplies:
- Domestic Sewing Machine – Husqvarna Viking
 - Shared Iron
- Student Supplies:
- 16” square of PFD (Prepared for Dyeing) fabric, or good quality white fabric or off-white fabric - solid colour (no pattern)
 - If not PFD, consider prewashing and ironing before class.
 - 18” square of low loft batting of your choice
 - 18” square of backing fabric of your choice
 - A fat quarter of muslin or inexpensive fabric (or an old piece of fabric)
 - Small scissors for cutting threads or thread snips
 - Pins to hold the layers together or Temporary Spray Adhesive such as Odif 505
 - Charcoal or dark grey thread for both top and bobbin – I use DecoBob, Invisafil or the Bottom Line for the bobbin and a cotton thread for the top – usually in 40 or 50 weight.
 - Plastic to cover the table
 - A few paper towels
 - A container for water
 - Notebook or paper for taking notes - optional
 - Mechanical pencil and eraser
 - Ruler such as 6” x 12” or similar

- A few commercial stencils for the background – any design of your choice - bring what you have. I will have some to share
- Inktense pencils
 - The 12-pencil set should suffice if purchasing. 24 pencils will give you more options of colours but use what you have or think you'll use in the future
 - Pencils are also sold separately, so that's a choice to pick the colours you'd like to use

NOTE: Make sure that the pencils you are purchasing or using in class are called INKTENSE by Derwent. Other types of pencils do not work.

- Paint brushes: I like the brand Simply Simmons. They are my go-to brushes (easy to find and inexpensive and they last a long time). I use angular brushes in 3/8", 1/4" for smaller areas and 1/2" for larger areas. Use what you have and give them a try to see what works for you.
- Round brushes work fine too as do flat brushes.

Note: Part of this class is on free-motion quilting. If you wear free-motion gloves, please have them handy. The same goes for any other tools you normally use when free-motion quilting.
